Housemates by Sofia Niazi

What you will need

- 1 sheet of plain paper
- 4-8 sheets of brightly coloured paper or printed *Housemates* pages 4-5 (Print the colour sheet on page 4 twice if you would like to make 8 housemates)
- Any black drawing materials (pencil, felt tip pen, ink, paint, pastel)
- An old magazine
- Scissors
- Glue stick
- String (optional)
- Blu Tack (optional)
- Paper clips (optional)

The Housemates activity is a great way to reimagine your home by creating characters. I like to explore and incorporate existing images that can be found around the home, combining this with pattern making and collage. I like to use this way of working when I don't know where to start and to spur my imagination. Having rules makes things easier. Start with a piece of paper and a single art material and fill the page with any pattern. Eventually by mixing your pattern cut-outs and drawing special features, you will have bright and bold new housemates! – Sofia Niazi

The Housemates art pack invites young people and their family/carer to explore their homes in new ways, identifying interesting patterns, and using books, newspapers or magazines to combine collage and drawing to create colourful creatures, animals and people to populate and brighten your home.

- 1. If using brightly coloured paper fold the sheets in half and cut them into A5 rectangles. If using the Housemates colour sheet cut out the 4 rectangles. You can make between 4-8 housemates - it's up to you!
- 2. Draw a different repeating pattern on each rectangle using 1 drawing material. You could draw zig zags with a pencil on 1 sheet and dots with a felt tip pen on another. What other patterns can you think of? Can you find any in your home? What's on the curtains, the wallpaper, your duvet cover, the sofa, your favourite t-shirt? Use them to inspire your pattern sheets. Fill the sheets up completely.
- 3. Cut out clothing shapes such as t-shirts, trousers, skirts and jumpers from your pattern sheets. You can either do this freehand using scissors or use a pencil to make an outline to cut around your clothing shapes. To start building up your Housemates collaged outfits, work out which clothing shapes look good together and stick them to the plain piece of paper. Using the different pattern sheets you can create colourful additions for the outfits such as buttons, pockets, hats and scarves! You should be able to fit about 4 outfits onto 1 page but spread them out and make sure you've left enough room to add heads and feet later.







- 4. Let's go on a hunt to find some housemates! Collect pictures of people, animals and creatures in your home. You can find them hiding in books, magazines, newspapers, leaflets and packaging (check with an adult first if it's ok to use). Once you've found some, cut their heads out and place them on your collage to decide which head looks good with each outfit. Using a pen or a pencil, carefully copy the heads onto the outfits one by one. Once you've drawn on all the heads, you can draw on hands and feet too.
- 5. Can you think of names for your housemates and where would you like them to live? Is there a special spot in your room or is there somewhere in your home that could do with some brightening up? It's up to you if you would like your creations to stay together by sticking them to the Housemates poster on page 5 or if you would like to carefully cut them out to live in different parts of your home either using Blu Tack (check with an adult first if it's ok to use) or by attaching them to string using paper clips. Decide

where you will hang them before you cut the string, so you know how long it should be. Good places to hang could be on your window, a banister, or

over a frame.
