



Rosie's Disobedient Press 9 - 25 August | Drop-in, FREE

For EAF24, we have invited Rosie's Disobedient Press, a collaborative project by artists Lisette May Monroe and Adrien Howard, to reflect on the framework for EAF's 20th Birthday and on the landscape of the city over the past 20 years. Rosie's have been working with archives and organisations local to Edinburgh to look at language and words as a historical act of resistance and bringing this into our modern day circumstance.

Rosie's will present works of textual intervention which will appear in print, on clothing, across windows and banners throughout the city.

Karol Radziszewski: Filo 9 - 25 August | Drop-in, FREE

Co-commissioned by EAF and Auto Italia, Karol Radziszewski's curated exhibition collects rare photographs and ephemera to trace the history of Filo Magazine, one of the first underground queer magazines in Central-Eastern Europe, founded by activist Ryszard Kisiel. Begun in response to Polish communist police suppression of sexual minorities, underground magazine Filo furthered activist conversations about sexuality, creativity and politics.

Alongside, Radziszewski presents his paintings of queer, Central-Eastern European historical figures, hung in a style recalling Eastern Bloc propaganda portraits, exploring the unknown histories of LGBTQ+ communities beyond the US and Western Europe. This will be Radziszewski's first Scottish solo exhibition.

Renèe Helèna Browne: Sanctus! 9 - 25 August | Drop-in, FREE

Sanctus! is a new film installation by Renèe Helèna Browne exploring devotion in relation to portraiture, faith, and belonging. The project borrows its title from the Latin word for 'holy', chanted three times by the Prophet Isaiah upon seeing an apparition of God. Through the roles of onlooker and interviewer, Browne presents a fragmented portrait of rally car culture as a route to finding understanding with their mother Helen. Shot across Ireland over the course of one year, the film work moves through various events, from opening ceremony celebrations, drivers' preparations, bystanders' excitements, to race day action, and adjacent diffing competitions. Weaving through these scenes are encounters between mother and child, as they examine Helen's relationship with faith, death, and the afterlife.

Care considerations: The work will speak openly about familial relations, religion, and grief.

Sanctus! is a co-commission between the University of Edinburgh Art Collection and Edinburgh Art Festival. At the end of the Festival presentation the work will be acquired by the Art Collection, and be used in the support of research and teaching across the University. PLATFORM24: Early Career Artist Award 9 - 25 August | Drop-in, FREE

Now in its tenth year, this annual group exhibition is designed to provide a dedicated platform for early-career artists based in Scotland and working in the field of contemporary art within EAF's programme. This year's Platform artists will respond to the themes of the EAF24 programme, centering intimacy, material memory, protest, and persecution.

Alaya Ang is a multi-disciplinary artist who seeks to tackle the multiple material and symbolic fractures produced by colonialism and capitalism, beginning from their own experience and proximate environments.

Edward Gwyn Jones works with moving image, text and printmaking. He appropriates and reframes seductive and latent artefacts in order to understand and complicate persistent social, technological and personal histories.









Tamara MacArthur uses installation and durational performance to explore longing, futility and the boundaries of intimacy. Their glittering installations are constructed for a moment of emotional intimacy between the viewer and themself.

Kialy Tihngang works in sculpture, video, textiles, animation and photomontage, typically involving elaborate sets, costumes, graphics, props, and collaborations with performers and musicians.

Selectors for the exhibition are Amal Khalaf, Director of Programmes at Cubitt and Civic Curator at the Serpentine Galleries, London and Eliel Jones, Curator of Performance and Time-based Media at KANAL; alongside EAF Curator Eleanor Edmondson.

EAF and the Roberts Institute of Art have co-commissioned the Scottish premiere of a performance work by Prem Sahib, originally co-commissioned by the Roberts Institute of Art and Somerset House Studios, and presented in London.

In their first time working with live vocalists, Prem Sahib presents performance work *Alleus*, a polyphony of live and pre-recorded voices. *Alleus* – 'Suella' spelled backwards – re-orders, re-directs and disrupts an antimmigration speech by former Home Secretary Suella Braverman. Performed under Edinburgh Castle by a group of vocalists, and with additional production developed in collaboration with artist Woodsy Bransfield, Sahib's piece works to resist the damaging speech practices often 'legitimised' by politicians and echoed through society in hate speech.

Care considerations: the performance will speak openly about racism, violence and feature sounds of xenophobic dialogue.



Más Arte Más Acción: Around a Tree – A marathon of voices to connect plants and people 9 - 25 August | Drop-In, FREE

Do Ho Suh: Tracing Time 16 February - 1 September | Drop-in, FREE

CIVIC PROGRAMME



Beginning in 2018, the Civic Engagement Programme is a year-round collaboration of artists, individuals and communities who are finding alternative ways to resist through the arts, and innovating safer, more

accessible and engaging programming during periods of social change.

EAF's continued evolution is built upon cultivating relationships with communities through **trauma-informed** approaches, which centre lived experience, and amplify voices from groups who have historically been excluded from public spaces and creative sectors. This has allowed us to create a range of **intersectional** projects and form ongoing creative collaborations with new and ongoing partnerships, including monthly sessions with our Wester Hailes Adult Art Group, SCORE Scotland, Rhubaba and other groups dedicated to social justice and art accessibility. Through our Civic Programme we continue to reach EAF's core goal: using our voice, platform and resources for the wider social good.

COMMUNITY WELLBEING COLLECTIVE

The Community Wellbeing Collective (CWC) is a durational social art collective of 30+ people living in and connected to Wester Hailes. It is a diverse, intergenerational, intercultural, working-class organisation imagining, practising and creating space for collective wellbeing towards change.

It was initiated by social practice artists Jeanne van Heeswijk and Bobby Sayers commissioned by Edinburgh Art Festival in partnership with WHALE Arts. They brought people together to discover and grow shared urgencies, forming a group where people can be themselves, activating their talents, sparking personal, community and structural transformation. This process resulted in the creation of the Community Wellbeing Space in an abandoned off-licence as part of EAF22.

The Space continues to be a living art-work brought to life each time a human comes to rest, connects and plays within it. Local members host the space and deliver political events and wellbeing activities which suspend the suffocation of intersecting oppressions, creating space to breathe and the possibility to dream together.

During this festival The Space will be open with a community-run programme of collaborative activities and events to understand common struggles in current systems, resist, imagine beyond them, and live future ways of being together as if it were possible in the present.

TERMINOLOGY

QTIPOC

An acronym standing for "Queer, Trans, Intersex, People of Colour", used to describe people who have been marginalised based on both their race and their gender or sexual identity. While the term describes the experience of a unique, complex form of discrimination, it is widely used to celebrate these communities.

Section 28

A piece of legislation active under Margaret Thatcher's government, banning "the promotion of homosexuality by local authorities", such as schools and councils. Section 28's harm against LGBTQ+ youth came from the lack of information and stigma around queerness it created.

Racialisation

A term describing the complex social processes through which certain people come to be seen as belonging to a certain race. It acknowledges that racial categories are not unchangeable facts, but stem from racist historical norms that are continually repeated within society.

Post-colonialism

A term describing the lasting impact of colonialism, and the way it continues to shape cultural conditions. Colonialism describes a set of conditions and experiences resulting from a history of subjugation of colonised peoples, such as US slavery and violent suppression throughout the "British Empire". While many countries have

since achieved formal independence, post-colonialism refers to ways in which this oppression continues, from the global political stage to education, pop culture, and more.

Queer

An umbrella term used to describe people whose sexuality, romantic orientation, and/or gender identity fall outside social norms. It can also be linked to a worldview which rejects a need for specific labels to describe identity, and which rejects other harmful social norms, such as racism, misogyny, classism, and ableism.

Trauma-informed

A practice taking into account the lasting impact of trauma, prioritising participants' emotional and physical safety, particularly when working with vulnerable groups such as care-experienced individuals or survivors of sexual violence.

Intersectionality

A critical framework for analysing multiple coexisting identities, privileges and oppressions, initially developed by Dr Kimberlé Crenshaw to describe the unique overlap of racism and misogyny experienced by Black women.

Exposition

Refers to "ethnological expositions", or the historical practice of publicly displaying human beings deemed racially other. A dehumanising violation of colonised peoples' human rights, these exhibits reinforced white supremacist ideas of Western superiority.

Our discounted Access tickets are dedicated to those who may experience additional obstacles to participating in the arts, such as our d/Deaf, Disabled, or low income patrons.
